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Events diary

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Pub News

Swale Branch

It seems to have been a steady couple of months since the last issue with not a great deal of change in the area. There are, however, a few snippets of information which you may or may not have heard.

On Sheppey, **The Highlander**, Minster Village. Timothy Taylor is currently on sale. Excellent condition and super value at only £3.0 a pint. There are also a new pair of balconies offering extensive views over Sheppey to the mainland. We understand, at the time of writing, that a snack bar is currently being set up. More news as we have it.

Fire damage has been caused to part of the beer garden and perimeter fencing at **The Height of Alma** in Alma Street, Sheerness. Whilst the damage is not too severe to the pub garden, a number of adjoining gardens and property were severely impacted. No loss of trading was reported.



Fire at The Seaside Pub

June 1st. There was a fire at **The Seaside, PH** in Minster on Sheppey. The issue was at the rear of the premises but was quickly brought under control by the fire brigade. Again, trade has not been impacted at the pub.

Popular landlord, Neil 'Rock' Webb, has sold **The Pilots Rest** in Sheerness to Richard and Rose Carroll. Changeover will be during the month of June to ensure a steady transition. **The Pilots Rest** is the current Swale branch Cider pub of the year so the new incumbents have big boots to fill.

In Iwade, the only village pub, **The Woolpack** had closed due to the previous licensee retiring. However, the new owners will be opening the pub at the end of June. The former head of **The Spyglass and Kettle** in Gillingham is set to take the helm and will offer both food and wet sales.

In Faversham, **The Bank**, is a new venture from craft brewer Time and Tide, has recently opened as a

taphouse and Neopolitan style cuisine bar in the former Lloyds bank on Court Street. Whilst, cask ale is not on offer, the brewery has a good reputation for their beer, served from the tap. Open Mon – Sat 12:00 to 23:00 and Sunday 12:00 to 22:30

Canterbury, Whitstable and Herne Bay Branch

The Royal Oak, Blean Common, re-opened on 24th April under what is assumed to be a new tenancy granted to 'The Blean Pub Co Ltd'. However, the planning application to turn the pub car park into a car wash has not been withdrawn. Meanwhile Blean Parish Council have applied to Canterbury City Council to have the pub (and its car park) listed as an Asset of Community Value (ACV).

Rodneys Head, Herne Bay, despite an undecided planning application dating back to 2024 to convert the former sports pub into 7 flats with a rear extension for a micro pub, building work appears to have started.

The Eight Bells, Canterbury, according to estate agents, Everard Cole this much missed local, which has been closed since the end of 2025, is back under offer. Sources tell us the proposed buyer is a publican and intends to run the pub as a free house.

The Butchers Arms,

Herne, in an unexpected but happy turn of events pioneering pub owner, Martyn Hillier MBE has handed over the reins of this celebrated micro pub to local businessman and regular, Paul Monroe, who is also rumoured to be in the process of acquiring the rest of the building.

The Old Coach and Horses, Harbledown, at the second time of asking Canterbury City Council have again refused Harbledown and Rough Common Parish Council's request to list the village pub as an ACV while owner and local developers, Paul Roberts and Paul Abbot have 2 planning applications to change the use of the pub and build a house in the garden at the same time as offering the pub for sale at an excessive price. As EKD goes to press it has been revealed that the pub will reopen in October under a tenancy agreement granted to Shailesh Dixit who also runs 'The Local' in Cockering Road, Chatham. <

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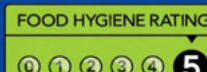
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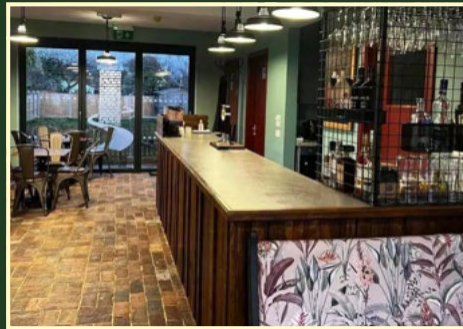

The Kings Head, Wincheap, Canterbury, closed since 2022 and sold in September 2025 the city's oldest continuous pub is still undergoing extensive repairs and refurbishment with scaffold now erected on the exterior.

Thanet Branch

The New Stag in Monkton re-opened on 1 May after being closed for ten months. The New landlord is Gary Norton who has run a number of different pubs in Kent over the years. A Gadd's cask ale is available, though the future of real beer depends on demand.

There has been a slight loss of cask ale available in Minster-in-Thanet. It has been withdrawn from **The Bell Inn** and **The Monkton** and **Minster Royal British Legion Club**. Shepherd Neame's **The Crown Inn** at Sarre has also ceased selling cask ale.

Trigger's Broom Ale House opened on Saturday 23 May in Broadstairs, a sweeping change to what was the **Four Candles Ale House** with a new name and a new interior layout. It is run by Paul Wainwright and Albert Berry, who also run the **Albion Inn** which is twenty feet away on the other side of the road.



The Magnet

The Magnet, Broadstairs. Nicola Munn of the Magnet writes: What a year 2026 has been so far. Thanks to the support of our staff, locals, regulars and visitors we were runner up in Thanet CAMRA's Pub of the year competition making us traditional pub of

the year for five consecutive years. We also won two categories in Kent Life magazine Food & Drink awards 2025: Best Pub and Best for Dogs and are nominated again for 2026.

2026 is going to be a big year for music as we continue to support Broadstairs Blues Bash and Broadstairs Folk Week, which we will be a part of this year again with a stunning array of musicians. We are also organising the third year of Broadstairs Jazzfest which continues to grow each year with a diverse and talented line up of Jazz musicians and singers.

We have a marvellous array of local and guest breweries on offer from Iron Pier, Kent Brewery, Romney, Tonbridge and many more. We regularly stock real ciders from Biddenden, Broadoak & others.

We like to give back, raising money to support local and national charities including Thanet Disabled Riding Centre, RNLI, Breast Cancer Now! raising £150,000 so far. We also organised a charity day, raising awareness of Motor Neurone Disease and making over £1,200 for the charity.

Dover Deal and Sandwich Branch

DEAL: **The Berry**, closed its doors for the last time. **The Eagle Tavern**, located next to Deal station, has added a hand pump serving Gadd's Number 5. **The Bar**, located at the top end of the High Street, has opened a small beer garden. **The Court Yard**, is to reopen at the beginning of July, following a fire in January. **The Queen Street Tap**, has also reopened, but no longer serves real ale.

DOVER: As a result of the sale of Beefeater & Brewers Fayre by Whitbread, **The Duke of York**, **Guston** and **The Plough, Church Hougham** have closed. **The Duke of York** may become a Toby Carvery. An application to change **The Malvern** to a shop has been approved.

FOLKESTONE: **Docker Brewery and Bakehouse** is opening a bakery, on the site of Dover's new creative centre and education campus on Bench Street. The bakery will be serving Docker beers. It's expected to open in August.

SANDWICH: **The Fleur de Lish** has reopened, following a long period of refurbishment, serving ales from the Wantsum brewery. **The Barbican Beer Garden**, situated on the banks of The Stour has opened, on the site of the former Quayside Bar & Grill.

RURAL: The Grade II listed **Fitzwalter Arms**, Goodnestone, which closed over a year ago, has reopened. A new micropub, **The Calf & a Half**, has opened in the rural hamlet of Goldstone, Ash offering ales from Ramsgate and their own bottled cider. Opening hours are from Friday to Sunday. A planning application for change of use to a care home has been submitted for **The Lighthouse**, Capelle Ferne. Plans include the retention of a micropub and community space. **The Dog & Duck**, Stourmouth, has reopened under new management.

Canterbury Ales, Chartham

That one will be back again soon! We continue to progress with upgrading the brewery to support growing demand. Canterbury Brewers & Distillers, Canterbury



Foundry Stout at 4.1% is a new permanent addition to the cask beer range of: Foundry Torpedo 4.5%, Foundrymans Gold 4%, Streetlight Porter 5.8%. A second release of Streetlight Single Malt Whisky is almost here.

Distilled within Canterbury's ancient city walls and handcrafted entirely by Jon, Streetlight already took home Gold at the World Whiskies Awards. This year's release is even more limited — just 300 individually numbered bottles.

There is an ever-changing list of cask and keg beers — always interesting.

The Tap Room is open every week from Wednesday to Sunday with Hotwood Pizzas available all weekend.

The Glaston brewery beer, music and food event will be at the Tap Room on July 25th. MasterChef Professional finalist Mark O'Brien will bring his live fire smoked barbeque to the brewery for the event.

Ramsgate Brewery, Ramsgate



Eddie Gadd, the founder and head brewer of Gadd's Ramsgate Brewery, has been named the Brewer of the Year 2026 by the All-Party Parliamentary Beer Group (APBPG).

Wantsum Brewery, St Nicholas at Wade



An exciting new collaboration between Wantsum and Moot Brewing, called the Invicta Brewing Project, intends to create a series of beers featuring all-Kent hops. The first brew will feature the Ernest hop.

The beers will be released to pubs/micros across Kent from 24th July. If successful, this will become an annual event and may involve other Kentish breweries.

Two new seasonal specials coming up in August: East v West Coast IPA's, each using the same malt and hops but with different yeast varieties to showcase the difference in styles.

The standard range of beers brewed are:

More's Head 3.7% Hoppy Bitter; 13813.8% Session IPA; Black Prince 3.9% Mild; Imperium 4.0% Best Bitter; Montgomery 4% American Pale Ale; Hurricane 4.5% New World IPA.

Wantsum re-badged some of their existing beers during the World Cup. 'Harrikane' and '4-2-2 Titude' have been seen around.

The Wantsum Brewery Taproom is open Friday, Saturday and Sunday all year round

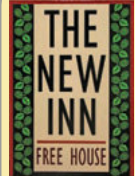
Brewing Industry Nationally

At the end of February, the Society of Independent Brewers and Associates (SIBA) reported that, on 1 January 2026, there were 1,578 breweries operating in the UK. This compares with 1,715 on 1 January 2025 and 1,828 on 1 January 2023. This demonstrates a net closure rate of almost three breweries a week. SIBA point out that levels of taxation and the restrictions of the tied house system are the main causes.

Each year kicks off with individual nominations from CAMRA members and volunteer tasting panels, then regional competitions. Every round of judging, including the final at Cambridge Beer Festival, uses a strict blind tasting policy.

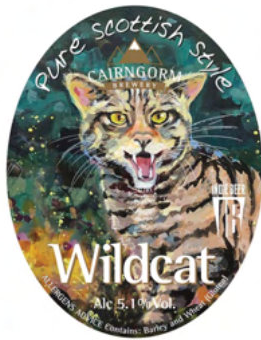

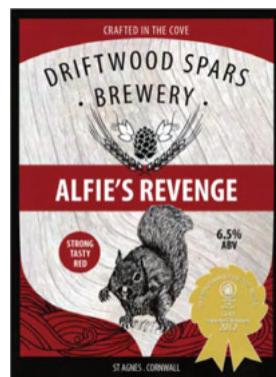

Historic London Pub Trail

Canterbury to London St Pancras takes fifty seven minutes by train: when you arrive you have some excellent pubs to choose from.

I picked six pubs on a circular route, all with interesting interior features and history and, of course, a great selection of local London and national cask ales.

The Lamb in Lamb's Conduit Street opened in 1720. In the late 19th century it was re-modelled with mahogany panelling, etched glass and mirrors. It is one of only three London pubs to still have snob screens around the bar. These were installed to prevent customers from being observed drinking by bar staff. The 19th century was a time of discernible class division. In the Victorian period actors and actresses drank here after their shows and there are many photographs of them lining the walls. Now, it is a popular pub serving Young's and two other changing ales. It serves excellent food and has friendly, welcoming bar staff.

offers a wide selection of pizzas.

A five minute walk finds the **Queen's Larder**, a small pub on the corner of Queen's Square. Its history can be traced back to a deed dated 1710 stating an alehouse was at that site. It had no name and was run by various people including a stationer and a carpenter. The current name arrived in the latter part of the reign of King George III. He suffered from mental illness and was being treated at a clinic in Queen's Square. Charlotte, his queen, rented the cellar beneath the pub to store special delicacies for the King. The renaming to The Queen's Larder honoured her devotion to her husband. Now it is a popular pub with three changing ales and serves food.

On the route back to St Pancras is the **Queen's Head** in Acton Street. A Victorian Grade II listed pub from circa 1764, it was refurbished in 1889 and still retains the original tiled walls, mirrors and the central bowed window. From 2014 to 2017 there was a brewery in the basement. A free house, it offers three cask ales often from London breweries.

The Scottish Stores in Caledonian Road is close to Kings Cross. Built in 1900/01, it is Grade II listed. The name derives from the Scottish traders who, when arriving at King's Cross, hung their venison in the bar awaiting sale. It has typical 20th century architecture, a central bar, elaborate wooden carvings and stained glass. In the late 20th and early 21st century it had a seedy reputation but luckily was renovated and restored in 2015. It is now a popular independent family-owned free house.

The last pub is the community-owned **King Charles I** in Northdown Street. Saved in 2015, it now has an ACV (asset of community value) awarded in 2021. It is a small neo-Georgian pub which was rebuilt in 1937. It features original interwar panelling and a curved bar. A good selection of cask ales is available. No food is served, though you are welcome to bring in your own from local cafes and restaurants.

Six pubs in six hours, a great way to spend a very pleasant afternoon in London.

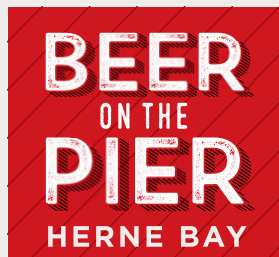

CELLARMANSHIP - Some beery terms and how to keep good beer

There are many variations on this topic, but I tried to keep this concise. Real ale is a living thing. It contains yeasts but can get contaminated with other microbes. It needs to be looked after carefully

Real ales are traditionally contained in a cask (avoid the term "barrel" as that's a 36-gallon cask). The photos show a firkin (a 9-gallon cask) sitting on a stillage (the shelving). The cask is stabilised using wooden chocks, two at the front (hypotenuse downwards!) and one at the back.

At the brewery, the brewers will have sealed the cask with a keystone (the circular bit at the lower left) and a circular shive, the red bit at the top. The shive has a depression in the centre, the tut. This cask has been vented by knocking in the tut with a mallet and punch. Our preferred punch is an old car valve, but landlords often use a hard wood or plastic peg (a hard spile). A porous wooden peg called a soft spile has been pressed gently into the hole to allow excess CO₂ gas to escape – you can see the froth bubbling out through the spile.

What are the steps the landlord needs to go through to serve the beer? There are some useful short YouTube videos, see below

- The cask needs to be placed on the stillage, horizontally or very slightly tilted, fixed in position as above with three chocks, and left for some hours to settle a bit. If there is plenty of room in the cellar (usually there isn't!) the casks can be left for days to develop flavour
- I recommend wiping the keystone and shive with food grade sterilising solution, as bits of them are going to be knocked into the beer.
- Venting/spiling: Use a mallet and the punch (with cloth round it as beer can be lively) to knock the tut into the cask. Knock the soft spile gently into the hole, as in the photo above, to allow the beer to breathe and to keep out microbes



- Leave the beer for around 24 hours to allow the sediment to settle and flavour to develop
- Tap the beer by knocking a tap in through the keystone. The photo below shows beer with a tap for serving simply by gravity – this is popular in micropubs and beer festivals. Most other pubs will use taps which connect to beer lines and a handpump
- Loosen the spile a bit while serving, or the beer won't be able to come out through the tap. Check the beer is clear (unless it's meant to be hazy) and that it tastes good
- Use a hard spile to seal the cask when the beer is not being served, e.g. overnight. This keeps microbes out and stops too much CO₂ escaping, so the beer doesn't go flat
- Tilting (stooping) the cask – don't move the cask at all, until it's about a third full. Then use the chock at the back to tilt about 12°. Be very gentle so the sediment isn't disturbed
- Serve the beer within 48-72 hours or it may go off
- When the cask is empty, seal the shive with a spile, and the keystone with a cork bung

Landlords often ask us how to get into the *Good Beer Guide*. The answer: they must serve consistently well-kept beer.

I asked a couple of successful landlords what they thought the most important factors were. In no particular order:

- Clean, tidy cellar and equipment
- Correct temperature, 11-13°C
- Clean the beer lines (the pipes which carry beer from cask to handpump) ideally every time you change a cask. Line-cleaning fluid must be used at least weekly.
- Use a hard spile overnight to maintain condition
- Serve the beer within 48-72 hours of venting, and check that it is still OK

Local CAMRA Online

You can only successfully manage a national organisation with over 220 volunteer-run branches if you provide the right support centrally, and CAMRA is very good at that. We have access to training and learning resources, national pub data, equipment for beer festivals and, as in the case of this article, a branch website builder, appropriately named BeerEngine.

In 2025 the Canterbury, Herne Bay & Whitstable branch elected to set up a website to complement its existing social media accounts - Instagram, Facebook and Meetup. Once configured and personalised to suit the branch's needs, whilst retaining the national CAMRA 'corporate' appearance (in our case picking the colour theme, some menu choices and the banner photo of Canterbury Cathedral at night) BeerEngine provided us with a powerful content management system (CMS) that we can easily populate with items of our choice, in particular news items and event details, and keep updated.

Social media are particularly useful for publicising our many and varied social events, but the website additionally gives us a platform for highlighting and recording in more detail things close to the heart of CAMRA, for example recording changes to local licensed premises and keeping pub information up-to-date (Local Pub Guide) for interested visitors. We have included explanations of beer scoring and how a pub gets selected for the Good Beer Guide and Pub of the Year, and a Members' area where members can download branch meeting minutes and other documents.

The national CAMRA site has a learning section and links to that site are in the branch menu. We don't want to duplicate the national site's content but one thing we have included is a panel with a link to the national site, to help people who are perhaps new to real ale choose the taste profile and beer style that suits them.

We also work with neighbouring branches, so often include links to their own events in our Branch Diary section.

Why Beer Bottles Should Be Brown

Beer has come a long way from the days of wooden casks and leather flagons, and the question of how best to store it has challenged people for centuries. Before pasteurisation, beer spoiled quickly, so it had to be brewed often and consumed fast. The idea of bottling beer was developed by a monk. He filled a winebottle from a cask for a picnic, forgot about it, and later found the beer still fresh. That was the beginning of bottled beer.

Sealing the bottle was the next hurdle. Brewers experimented with wax and cork before wire closures and eventually today's crown caps became standard. Early bottles were short and bell-shaped, often clothed with wires like mason jars. At that time all bottled beer contained yeast, which continued fermenting as it would in a cask. As the yeast consumed remaining sugars in the beer, it produced carbon dioxide that made the drink fizzy.

Before paper labels, most breweries embossed their names directly into the glass. Some examples are engraved and some have the names in the glass. Over time, bottles evolved into the taller, slimmer shapes familiar today.

The longstanding use of brown or green glass has a scientific basis. Sunlight

contains ultraviolet rays that degrade proteins in beer, reducing shelf life and affecting flavour. Refrigeration and pasteurisation later made light protection less critical, but tradition kept dark glass in widespread use. In recent decades some breweries adopted clear bottles to showcase the beer's colour.

Another explanation for brown bottles lies in glassmaking history. Producing crystal clear glass was difficult before industrial techniques were developed, so coloured glass was the practical default. Tradition again played its part, and brown remains the standard. A few beers—such as Old Speckled Hen and Badger Tanglefoot—are marketed in clear bottles, though dark beers almost never are. Wychwood Hobgoblin briefly tried clear glass before returning to brown.

By law all bottled beers must display sell-by dates. In 2009 I acquired some Queen Elizabeth II Silver Jubilee Ales from 1977 with damaged labels. These were strong beers, around 6%. As they were of limited collectable value I decided to drink them, each was excellent. Yes, they

were in dark glass bottles

but seeming evidence that sell-by dates may be meaningless for properly stored beer.

For the technically minded: exposure to light breaks down isohumulones in hops into free radicals that react with sulphur-containing proteins, forming

3methyl-2butene-1thiol—the compound responsible for the “lightstruck” or bad egg smell. Damage can occur within minutes in sunlight, and fluorescent lighting can have the same effect over a longer period. It is suggested that Mexicans began adding lime wedges to beer to mask the smell and taste of sun-damaged beer.

As time goes by

Sitting in the pub downing the last drop to catch that bus; but where is the pub clock? Now, this is stepping back in time a little, no pun intended. Some years ago, many breweries produced advertising in various forms, some of which have become collectable. Most notable might be the **Guinness** John Gilroy range of animals, posters, flying wall toucans, ashtrays, and lamps. However, they also produced advertising wall clocks.

My original introduction to electric advertising clocks was at number 56, my grandma's house where a KLG sparkplug advert sat silently. The glass electric clock, rather unlike the large clockwork item sitting alongside, always caught my eye. I was a youngster and at first didn't realise it had to be "plugged in". It told the correct time but only twice a day. It was the one thing I wanted when gran's house was cleared; and I still have that clock.

I can't recall when I bought the first brewery item, a Guinness clock, glass with illuminated engraved characters. I do however remember where I

bought the second Guinness clock, I had taken my car to Pipecraft in Essex to have an exhaust made. I sat in the car when they took it on the lift, peering out of the window, there it was, right at the top of the wall. A sum of money for the tea fund changed hands and the clock went home, much cheaper than the custom exhaust.

Some of you may recall a similar item at the Black Lion in Lynsted where the writing on the face looked Dutch but I believe it was Afrikaans. Chris wouldn't sell it.

Then there was the closing wool shop with the **Paton and Baldwins** clock. I rue the day I let the condom clock, adorning a Canterbury hairdresser's window, slip through my fingers. It was too expensive. I digress, these are all powered by Smiths electric motors though I'm not sure that Smiths Clocks manufactured the whole item. Later models offered by Guinness and others were Perspex with mains voltage motors. Many other businesses offered these clocks; there is one currently in auction for **Mitchell & Butlers**, and a "Treat yourself to a Tavern"; which I think came from **H. & G. Simonds Ltd** of Reading. Pub wall clocks could advertise whisky or cigarettes. The **Craven A** red and silver box type clock became quite popular and now rare. I only have a broken one.

These clocks were probably not exclusive to Smiths as Temco and Ferranti had a thriving domestic electric clock following. Unfortunately, even some restorers think it is OK to switch the mains original clock for a modern quartz battery unit. To me that is not restoration.

I know Fremlinshad glass advertising signs but I've yet to come across a clock of the same style, or of any other local brewery. Perhaps you know better, do let me know. My collection does not only comprise advertising items but all synchronous electric clocks, glass, bakelite, metal and wooden; from Art Deco 1930s and including Westclox and Metamec 1960s models as well as a couple of Goblins!

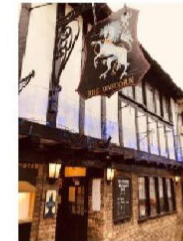

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Trigger's Broom Ale House, Broadstairs

On Saturday 23 May, a sweeping change was made to what was the Four Candles Alehouse, reopening with a new name and a new interior layout.

But let us first recall the Four Candles – owned by Mike Beaumont and opened in 2012, it was the twelfth micro pub in the UK and the third in Thanet. After a couple of years of selling other people's beers, Mike began to brew his own at the pub with paid assistance from brewer Paul Wenham-Jones, plus some advice from Eddie Gadd of Ramsgate Brewery.

One time he had to ask JD Wetherspoon to desist from using a logo of crossed fork handles on one of their pub's social media pages. Mike had created this logo for his business, was using it and had officially trademarked it, Wetherspoon did comply with the request and apologised.

Having acquired the Conqueror Alehouse in

Ramsgate just in time for Covid, Mike was then forced to relinquish it in late 2023 as post-Covid trade was too slow in picking-up. During this time, it sold only Four Candles beers. The Conqueror has since reopened under new management but still has much of the external signage that Mike put up referencing his William the Conqueror French roots.

Beer wise, Mike produced mainly cask beer with a brief period of bottled beers. He used simple descriptive names, sometimes claiming that no beer was ever brewed more than once. Names included; Pecan Porter, Citra Session, Stout, Pacific IPA, Waimea IPA, Green Hop IPA, Target Bitter, Juniper Rye, Wheat IPA, Best Bitter plus many others. The ABVs were almost all between 3.5% and 5%. A Four Candles beer was the first to run out at the Planet Thanet Beer Festival three years running. The pub was in CAMRA's Good Beer Guide 2015, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2025 and 2026. All in all, what a great achievement.

All this said, the pub is now called Trigger's Broom and is run by Paul Wainwright and Albert Berry, who also run the Albion Inn which is twenty feet away on the other side of the road. Incidentally, Mike Beaumont also stepped in once as licensee for the Albion Inn while some legal difficulties were ironed out under previous management there. Mike didn't want the Albion to close, lose business impetus and then be converted to a house.

Today Trigger's Broom is not a brewpub though it does continue to be of modest size with its large windows, including a newly revealed window, that give it a sense of space. It has a mix of high and regular tables including some outdoor seating to the front. Due to limits of floor space only assistance dogs are allowed inside. It has two hand pumps for cask ale plus some racked casks with cold water fed cooling jackets by the bar.

...discussing the meaning of life, and beer....mainly beer; when the chap sitting next to me suddenly pronounced; 'CAMRA members. The most boring people in the world. All beards and beer-guts droning on about real ale.'

'Right' I said, 'But you are sitting in a Kentish free house enjoying affordable pints of good cask beer from small breweries around the country. None of which would have been possible without CAMRA.'

My new friend laughed cynically, 'So, that was then, what is the point of CAMRA today?'

It was a fair challenge. Rather than point out my distinct lack of both beard and beer gut, I finished my pint and wandered off to think about what I should have said.

Formed 55 years ago, CAMRA surprisingly quickly changed the face of British pubs and brewing. Cask ale and hand pumps that were then rapidly disappearing can now be found in even the remotest corners of the land. Beer quality, most certainly not a given when CAMRA started, is now driven by competition for a Good Beer Guide listing or a Pub of the Year achievement, along with industry-run quality accreditation, inspired and supported by CAMRA.

Guide listings, awards and beer festivals still matter. They incentivise pubs and breweries to maintain high standards. A CAMRA award still announces to drinkers that a pub takes its beer seriously.

Despite all this activity we continue to lose pubs at a disturbing rate. Escalating costs, business rates, energy bills and staff costs have forced many pubs into closure, as unfortunately we often report in these pages. Without the campaigning work of CAMRA's local branches we would have lost a great many more. Local branches are often the first to raise the alarm when a pub is threatened and the first to help communities organise to protect their local amenity. CAMRA is the only national body consistently lobbying for stronger planning protections and was crucial in securing Asset of Community Value status for pubs and closing loopholes that allowed conversions without planning permission.

Those local branches and the thousands of active members around the country are CAMRA's greatest strength. No trade body or government department has any similar level of grassroots organisation. The members survey pubs, organise beer festivals, support local communities and work to keep local pubs and beer choice alive. This is not nostalgia. Many of our pubs and breweries still exist because local CAMRA members cared enough to act. And, fortunately, continue to act persistently and often thanklessly.

My new friend may cling to the tired CAMRA stereotype. I will join him for another pint sometime soon and help him understand that, if he wishes to continue to enjoy his pubs and choices of beer, he really needs to raise a glass and offer a word of thanks to those boring CAMRA members.

The Pub Gardens of Swale

Kent may be known as the Garden of England with its many lovely, famous estates, but its pub gardens rarely get the same attention. When was the last time you visited a pub and simply enjoyed relaxing in its garden? We will take a brief tour of some notable town pubs in Swale and see what makes their gardens special.

We begin on the sun-kissed Isle of Sheppey. In a quiet corner of Marine Town, Sheerness, just a stone's throw from the seafront, sits **The Heights of Alma**. Tucked at the end of a row of Victorian terraces and named after events of the Crimean War, as are many adjoining streets, the pub welcomes both locals and visitors in its traditional bars. To the rear lies a lovely, secluded garden, large enough for a dozen tables or more, with lawns, a patio and a colourful mix of shrubs and flowering plants. A great feature is 'The Shack at the Back', a cookhouse serving excellent, sensibly priced pub grub. With its homely, welcoming atmosphere, it's well worth checking the pub's website (<https://heightsofalmasheppey.co.uk/>) or Facebook page for opening times.

From Sheppey we head to **The Elephant**, 31 The Mall, Faversham, long regarded as a bastion

of excellent cask ale. In the front of the building, you are greeted with a display of traditional signage, colourful planters, wooden casks converted into tables and colourful stained and etched glass. But the real surprise lies beyond the bar. Through a door in the right-hand corner you enter a covered courtyard adorned with vintage memorabilia, leading to a garden room great for gatherings and full of beer history. The main garden is a blaze of colour, with a small lawn, tables, a raised paved patio and a central fishpond and fountain. Benches, vines and an array of flora and fauna create a space that Kew Gardens would be proud of. It's a lovely spot to while away the hours—just remember to nip back to the bar for another pint.

In Sittingbourne, look down the driveway of **The Red Lion** on the High Street and you'll find a charming beer garden right in the heart of town. This historic inn has been popular for generations, and its greenery surrounded cobbled courtyard offers a peaceful, relaxed ambience, whether you are meeting up for a casual drink or looking to unwind after a stressful day. With plenty of tables and a varied choice of ale and lager, it's a real summer suntrap.

Ospringe, between Norton Ash and Faversham, is a place that sees much traffic mostly just passing through—but it's worth stopping at **The Shiplinn and Cow Shed** on the corner of Ospringe Street and Ospringe Road. This 16th-century building, operated by the Lamba family since 2022, has been made into a garden wonderland. The addition of The Cow Shed has transformed the place. From the rear of the

pub you step out onto lush lawns, patios and seating areas designed with entertaining in mind. In 2026 the pub was a finalist in the British Pub Awards for its renowned food offering. With car parking, a sunny aspect, outdoor mood lighting and a lively atmosphere—especially when the fire pit is lit—this is another garden well worth visiting.

Back in Faversham town, **The Market Tavern** at 42 East Street boasts what is probably the largest beer garden in the town. During the summer months you may even see the Kentish game of Bat and Trap being played—only a handful of pubs still host this traditional game, and this is one of the best places to enjoy it. Run by Tim and Lacey Stowell, who are also licensees of **The Bear** in the town centre, the pub is a community-focused local. In addition to Bat and Trap there is a walled perimeter garden, grassy and paved areas, with plenty of bench seating. It's also close to the town's recreation ground

if you fancy extending your visit in the town.

Over in Queenborough, **The Rose Inn**, 80 High Street, offers a long garden adjacent to the town's historic church. With a tented patio, lawns and garden seating, it's a pleasant space to while away the hours. Trees and atmospheric lighting make it especially appealing in the evening, and the covered event stage hosts regular live acts.

These are just a handful of the borough's town pub gardens—there are many more waiting to be explored. So, when the sun is

shining, why not set aside a day to discover a few of them for yourself?

Ramsgate has the World's finest Shelters

In 1939 Ramsgate was ready for the war, it had built nearly three miles of underground air raid precaution ARP shelters. With entrances all around the town, these tunnels saved thousands of lives in the many raids that followed. The worst was 24th August 1940 when over 500 bombs were dropped on the town in a 5-minute period, killing 31 people of all ages.

It is possible to visit these shelters from the former railway tunnel located in the East Cliff, just along from the harbour. The museum is free to visit and offers four regular tours, where you are guided underground into the tunnels to experience what it was like over 85 years ago. One special tour takes you above ground where you walk the route of the Tunnels. See www.ramsgatetunnels.org for further information.

Having done this tour, I thought it might be interesting to see what pubs are still open along the route. Of those that are, some are in the Good Beer Guide or are contenders for inclusion.

Start at the West Cliff on the Paragon (1-Churchill Tavern). At the top of the stairs from the sailor's church



on the harbour, follow Addington Street (2-Queen Charlotte, 3-The Falstaff) to the end and turn left into West Cliff Road (4-Bedford Inn, 5-Artillery Arms). Then along Crescent Road, Vale Square, and Marlborough Road, then turn right into North Avenue, left into Elms Avenue, briefly crossing into Cannon Road diagonally through the car park to Paradise. Cross the High Street (6-The Pub, 7-Rose of England). Then turn into Eagle Hill, cross Chatham Street (8-The East Kent Arms) into Chatham Place. Turn right on to Boundary Road, follow the hill down to the lights, (branching off to 9-Elephant and Castle, 10-Montefiore Arms, 11-The Honeysuckle Inn). From Boundary Road go up Victoria Road to the end where you see the Granville Theatre at the top of the East Cliff. Go down the 120 Augusta Steps and you are at the Ramsgate Tunnels entrance 100 yards from the harbour (12-Royal Victoria Pavilion) and all the pubs on Harbour Parade and the centre of Ramsgate.

The Kings Arms in Upper Upnor was placed third.

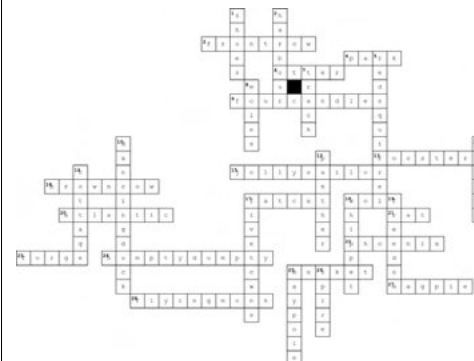
The Prince of Ales recently showcased their tenth anniversary beer festival from the 12th to 15th March with ten real ales on offer.

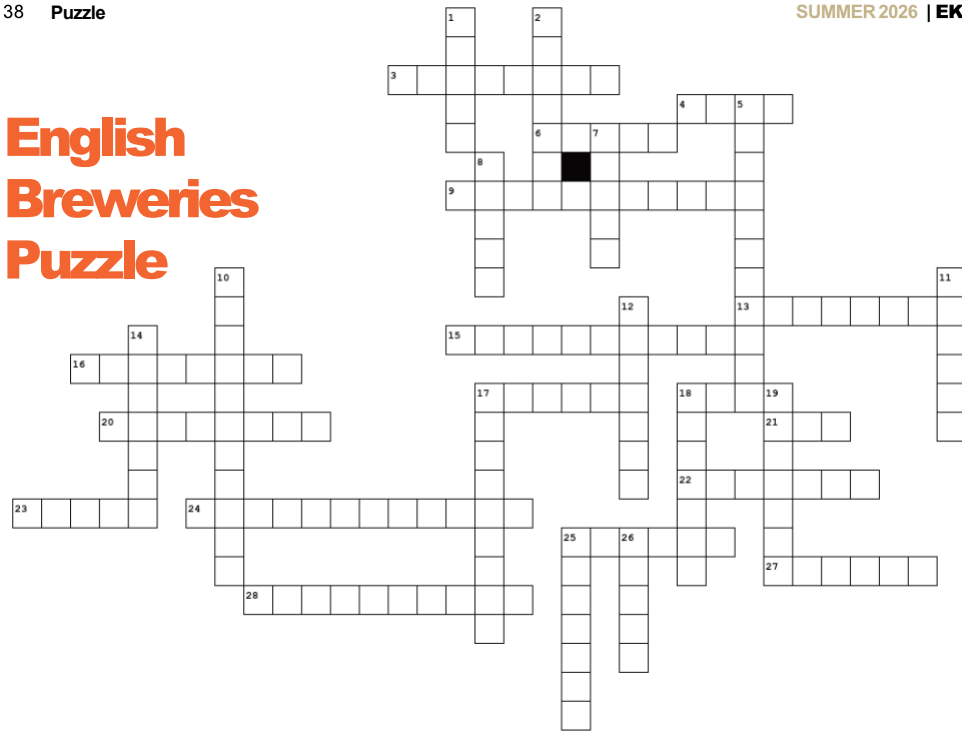
